**5. INFORMATION/DISCUSSION ITEMS:**

- a. Welcome Rosemarie Smallcombe to the CSEDD Board as Mariposa County's Elected Member  
*The board welcomed new member from Mariposa, Rosemarie Smallcombe, and new Tuolumne Citizen member, Robbie Bergstrom.*
- b. New Brown Act rules concerning teleconference attendance by board members – David Thoeny  
*D. Thoeny notified the board that starting Feb. 28<sup>th</sup>, voting board members will need to attend meetings in-person to abide by a recent update to the Brown Act regulations. The board gave Dave direction to add alternate Mother Lode Job*

*Training locations as future permanent teleconference locations for CSEDD Meetings, which will be open to the public following Brown Act guidelines.*

- c. Designated counties for flood disaster assistance (FEMA & SBA)  
*K. Gallino shared that Calaveras County was not originally included the FEMA disaster assistance but has since been added and received declarations for individual and public assistance. She advised that the other member counties check on their status for FEMA and SBA designation.*
- d. Update on the California Advanced Services Fund (CASF) Rural and Urban Regional Broadband Consortia grant application – Kathy Gallino  
*Kathy notified the board that she and CSEDD staff are working on finalizing paperwork for CASF and will be receiving the first round of funding. K.Gallino also notified the board that she would like to schedule a kick-off meeting with those from the board that are on the CASF/Broadband team.*
- e. Update on the Community Economic Resilience Fund (CERF) Regional Planning Grant – Sierra Business Council (SBC)  
*Erika Harvey from SBC updated the board that they still have not gotten an update on the grant award. In the meantime, the SBC has published 3 job postings for this project and are trying to get people to sign up for the High Road Transition Council (HRTC) and HRTC sub-committees. R.Smallcombe suggested sending the postings to Sierra Nevada Alliance. K.Warburton asked for details on how the signups are conducted for HRTC sub-committees and if there is a way to see who has already applied. Erika informed the board that they are trying to get initial signups right now, then those people will be distributed amongst the sub-committees. She also informed the board that she will send out an email with details on who has already signed up.*
- f. Update on Eastern Sierra K-16 Planning Grant – ARCHES  
*Dave gave a brief overview on the Eastern Sierra K-16 Planning Grant. The board requested that the meeting invites be sent to the county superintendents and include other education partners. The board also requested more information on the grant such as the grant amount and project details. CSEDD staff informed the board they will reach out to the grant organizer with the board's suggested contacts to include and will request that a grant representative be present at the next meeting to answer and of the board's questions.*
- g. Update on the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) project - Chico State Enterprises  
*Courtney updated the board on the progress of the CEDS. She shared with the board that they have conducted 60 interviews. The board discussed proposed visions and goals of the CEDS. (See handouts A and B attached)*

h. Board member topics of interest (Roundtable)

- *CSEDD Board staff notified the board that they will be collecting Form 700s*
- *K. Gallino notified the board that TSS is conducting a Biomass study, and that CSEDD should consider discussing this with them at a future meeting to make sure efforts aren't duplicated. She also informed the board that some of the CSEDD member counties are not in regulation with electrical vehicle compliance. T. Schiff shared that Mariposa is currently in the process of becoming compliant and is on the final step of the process.*
- *D. Thoeny announced that SBDC will be co-locating with the Sonora MLJT office and there will be a grand opening event and 2 small business workshops on February 21<sup>st</sup>.*
- *Jaron Brandon updated the board that he is the new Chair of Calaveras Healthy Impact Product Solutions (CHIPS), and they are currently looking for additional board members and participants. He also informed the board he is applying for a seed program for bio bricks. In addition, he has been in contact with Mono County regarding a White River Partnership with the U.S. Forest Service to collaborate on Forest Service Worker Housing. Lastly, he notified the board that CA is in the process of their 5<sup>th</sup> climate change assessment and wants to ensure CSEDD is involved in the stakeholder process.*

*Guest Len Degroot, Tuolumne County Broadband, addressed the board for public comment. He notified the board that there is an upcoming Central Sierra Broadband Utility Zone Consortium grant that pays for support for Internet Service Providers (ISP) who want to apply for grants. Although important for all ISPs, it will be especially important for local ISPs to apply to get the support and consultants they need. The grant opens for applications in a couple of weeks.*

**5. INFORMATION/DISCUSSION ITEMS**

- 5.1. Update on the Community Economic Resilience Fund (CERF) Regional Planning Grant – Sierra Business Council  
*Erika Harvey (Sierra Business Council) notified the board that they have hired a Westside Project Navigator that will be starting on June 1<sup>st</sup>. She shared that the initial planning phase is complete and turned in, and the Sierra Business Council will be working on the Regional Summary next. The first HRTC meeting is set to take place June 16<sup>th</sup> in Bishop, CA and at Mother Lode Job Training Tuolumne. She also notified the board that the East Side has a focus group scheduled for next week with the tribe.*
- 5.2. Update on Eastern Sierra K-16 Planning Grant – ARCHES  
*Amy Frost informed the board that Education, I.T., and Healthcare are the three industries that have been recommended to the Executive Committee for the K-16 Planning Grant. The Executive Committee will choose two industries from the list of recommended industries to create career development and career pathways in. The board will be updated with their selection once one is made.*
- 5.3. Update on the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) project - Chico State Enterprises  
*Courtney addressed the board on this matter. She shared that her team is at a crucial part in the CEDS process where she is in need of specific project examples to connect with over-arching goals from the region.*
- *Frank Axe suggested that the CEDS addresses coordination with Regional Biomass and possibly a regional Biomass Facility.*
  - *Anaiah Kirk proposed that the CEDS include an initiative around water, specific to forest health and restoration. He shared that Tuolumne just reactivated their Water Agency and have been partnering with Turlock Irrigation District and others to get a baseline of data and information to show the impact that forest management has on watershed downstream.*
  - *Anaiah also shared his idea of involving CalTrans and the impact that closed highways have on tourism in the county. He explained that if there was an updated policy set with CalTrans to open roads by Memorial weekend, or around our “High Economic Summer” timeframe, this would benefit the counties specifically with tourism.*
  - *Amy Frost, Mother Lode Job Training Deputy Director, notified Courtney that the education piece could also touch on Industry having a voice in determining educational opportunities and the development of curriculum. She shared that there has been recent successes in creating educational and career opportunities in the region with Forestry and Healthcare. Industry, Workforce Development, and Education are working together to keep the job opportunities available to our local workforce instead of bringing in outside workers.*

*Courtney requested that board members send additional projects and initiative information by June 15<sup>th</sup>.*

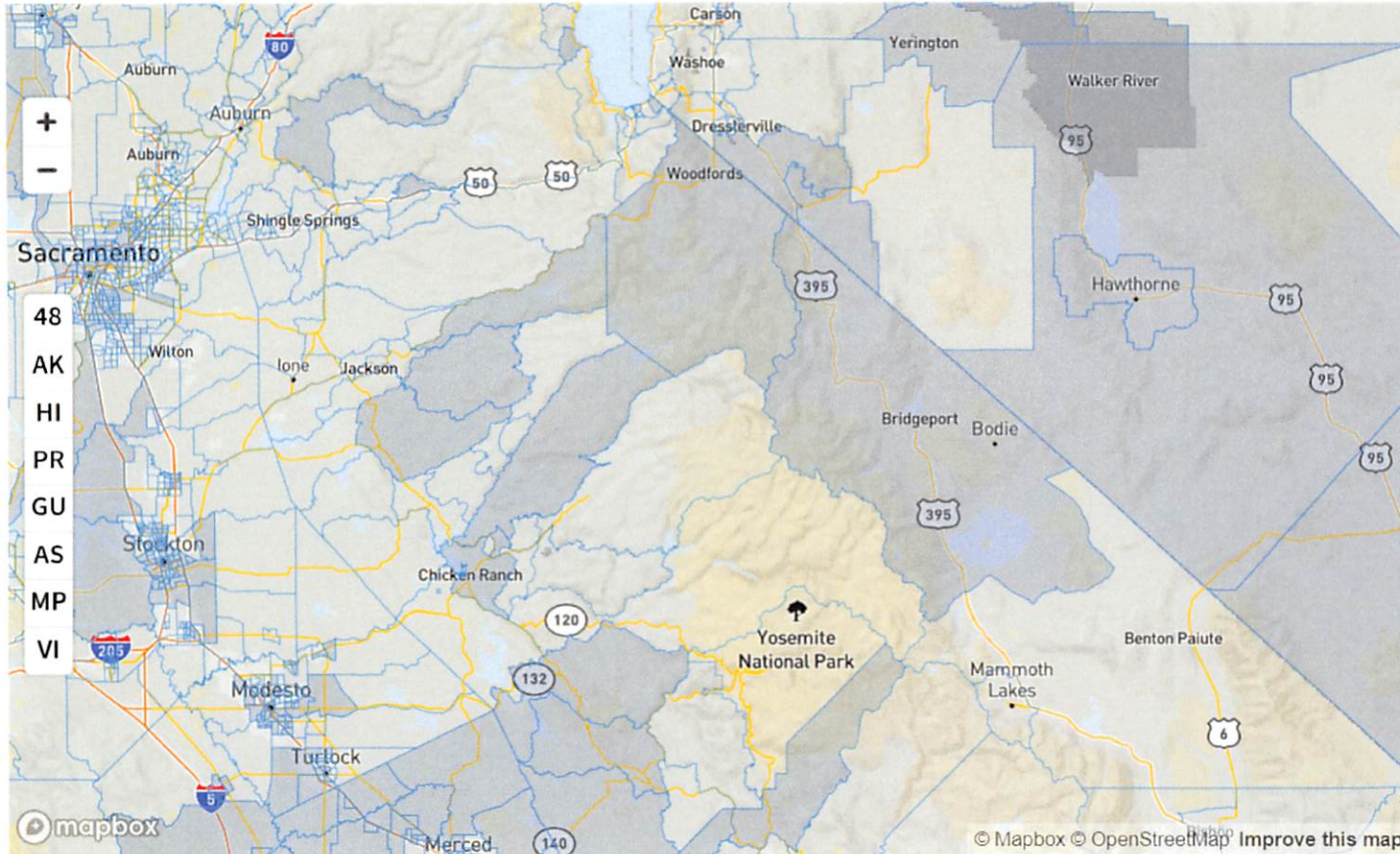

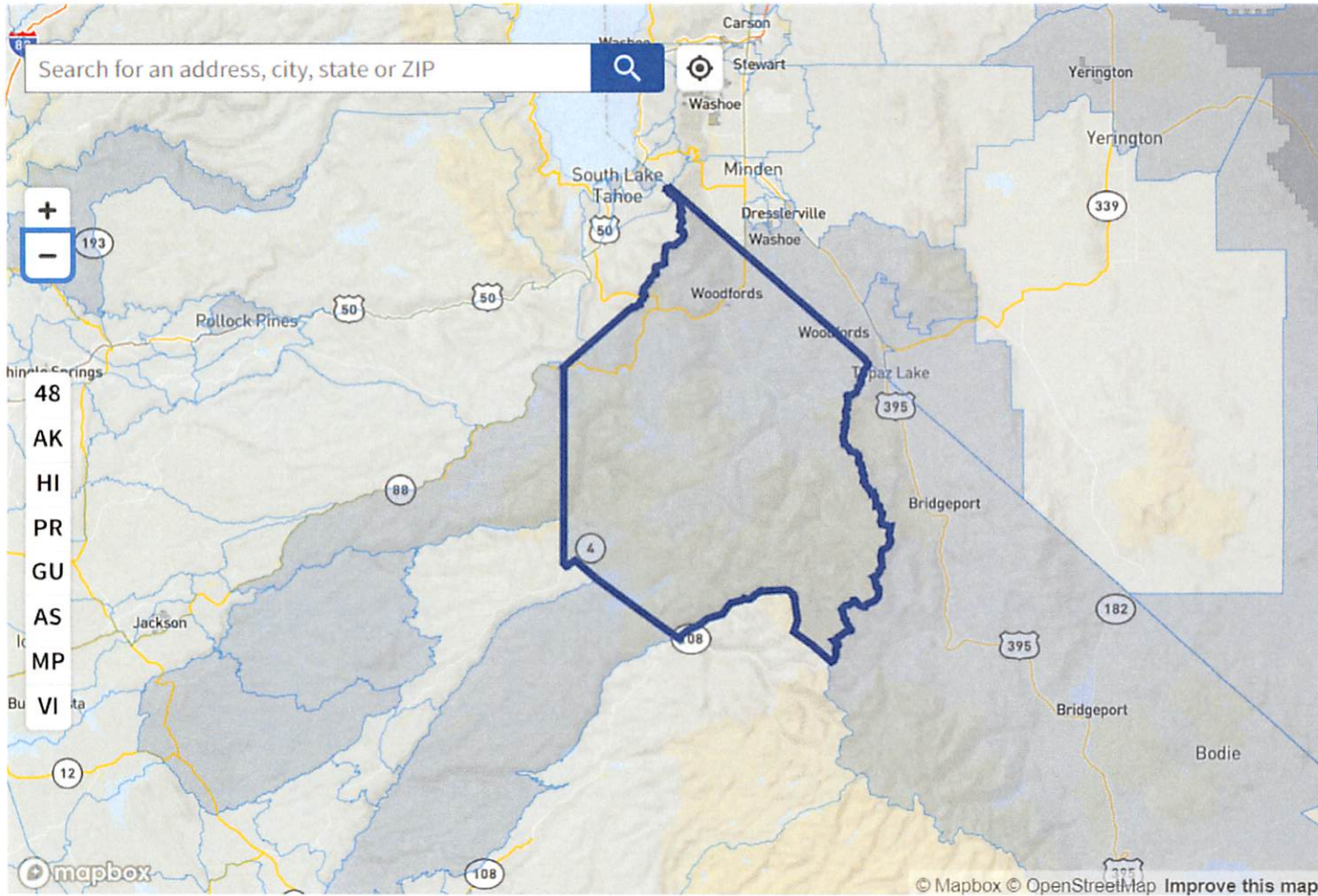

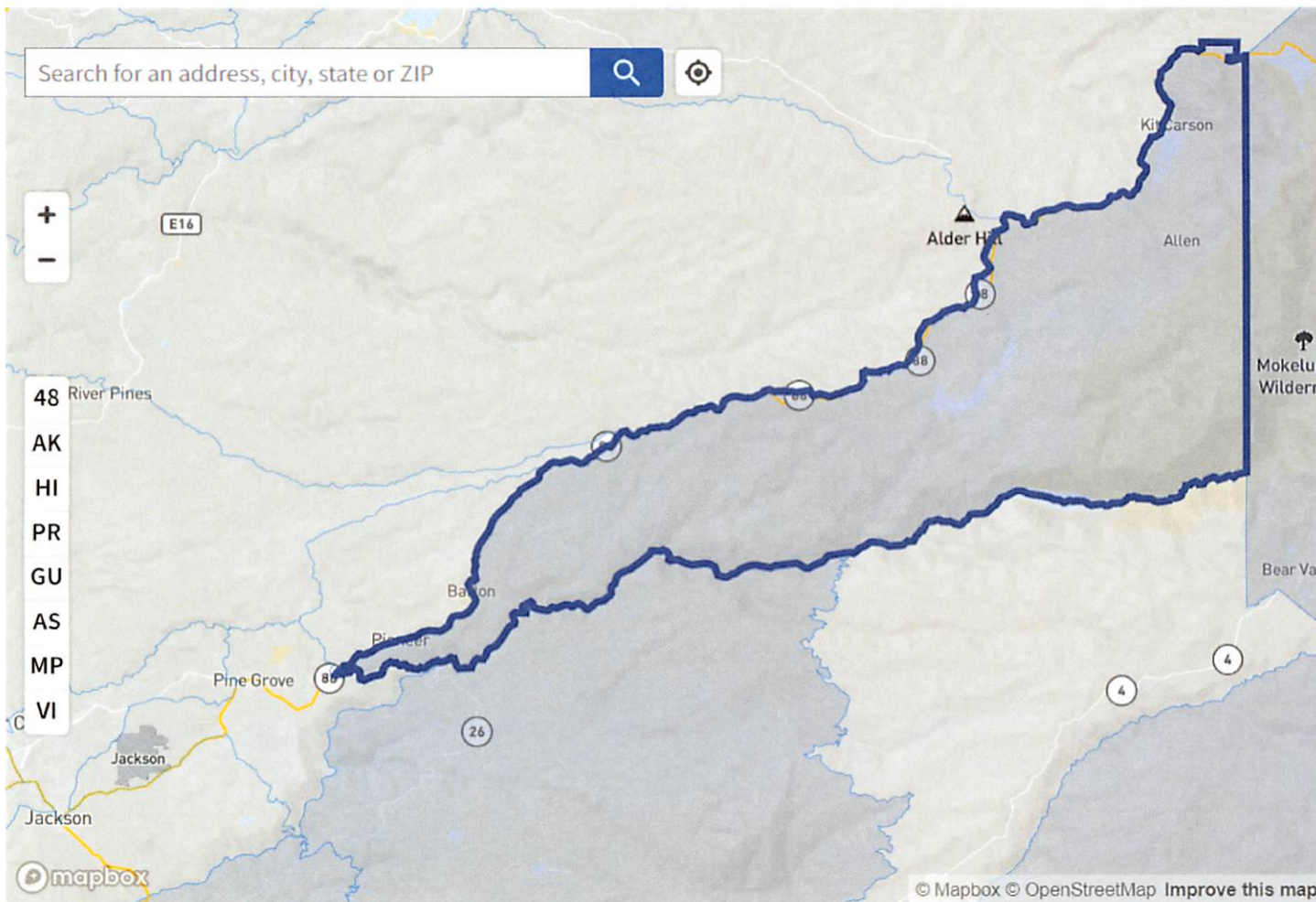
